

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DIRECTIONS FROM <u>SFO</u> AIRPORT TO THE CARDINAL HOTEL

BY RIDESHARE/TAXI

TIME: 30-60 minutes **PRICE:** \$50-150, depending on arrival time and surge pricing

TAXIS: Taxis depart from the designated taxi zones located at the roadway center islands, on the Arrivals/Baggage Claim Level of all terminals. <u>Note</u>: Taxis are consistently more expensive than rideshares.

RIDESHARES, DOMESTIC ARRIVALS: Lyft, Uber, and YRide Domestic pick ups are located on Level 5 of the Domestic Garage.

RIDESHARES, INTERNATIONAL ARRIVALS: Guests should proceed to the Departures/Ticketing Level center island Lyft, Uber, and YRide Pick-Up/Drop-Off zones 14-17 for both pick ups and drop offs.

BY PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

TIME: 75-120 minutes

PRICE: \$12

- 1. <u>SFO → Millbrae Transit Center</u>
 - a. Via BUS: Take the "samTrans Millbrae" Bus to Millbrae Transit Center
 - b. **Via BART:** Take SFO's AirTrain to the Garage G/BART station stop which is located on the Departures/Ticketing Level of the International Terminal. Board a Millbrae bound BART train to the Millbrae station.
- 2. <u>Millbrae Transit Center → Palo Alto Transit Center</u>
 - a.Purchase tickets on CalTrain platform; tickets are NOT sold on the train. If you arrived via the BART, exit the BART system and enter CalTrain system. Board the Southbound CalTrain.
- 3. Palo Alto Transit Center \rightarrow The Cardinal Hotel
 - a. The walk to the hotel is on flat terrain and should take approximately 8 minutes.
 - b. A rideshare is likely a 5 minute drive.

FOR TERMINAL A ARRIVALS: All Rideshare Pick-ups occur at Arrivals Curbside - Stop 1; Taxis are accessible from Stop 2.

FOR TERMINAL B ARRIVALS: All Rideshare Pick-ups occur at Ground Transportation Island - Stops 8 & 9; All taxis are accessible at Stop 1.

PARKING AT THE CARDINAL HOTEL

The Cardinal Hotel does not have free on-site parking.

PALO ALTO PARKING (WEEKDAYS)

During Business Hours (8am - 5pm)

• All street and lot parking is FREE, but time-limited.

For Short-Term (<3 hours) Parking (8am - 5pm):

- Street parking is FREE, but limited to **2 hours** between 8am-5pm.
- Lot or garage parking is FREE but time limited for maximum of 3 hours between 8am to 5pm. We recommend parking in the City of Palo Alto City Hall underground garage (map below).

For Long Term (>3 hours) Parking (8am - 5pm):

- Those wishing to leave their car in Palo Alto during the weekdays for more than 3 hours between 8am and 5pm should buy the \$15 parking permit from The Cardinal Hotel for \$15.
- This permit allows for all-day (8am-5pm) weekday parking at the City Hall Parking Garage *map below). After 5pm, parking is free.

Outside of Business Hours (6pm - 8am)

• All street and lot parking is FREE and not time-limited.



PALO ALTO PARKING (WEEKEND)

Street parking is free and unrestricted from 5pm on Friday to 8am on Monday.


STANFORD UNIVERSITY PARKING (WEEKDAYS)


MARGUERITE SHUTTLE WEEKEND SCHEDULE

NATURAL SCENERY ON CAMPUS

STANFORD DISH WALK

Distance 3.23 miles

Completely paved, although varying steepness levels. Lacking in shade, so make sure to bring water.

ARBORETUM AND TOYON GROVES

Distance 2-4 miles

Completely paved and flat terrain. Visit the desert garden, the Leland-Stanford mausoleum, and the Angel of Grief statue on your walk around Stanford Grounds.

STANFORD CAMPUS ACTIVITIES -

MEMORIAL CHURCH

COST: Free

Come visit this interdenominational church and enjoy the pipe organ, stained glass windows, and mosaics. Public tours available.

CANTOR ARTS CENTER & RODIN SCULPTURE GARDEN

COST: Free

Thanks to one of the Cantor's curators, the CAC houses the largest collection of sculptures by Auguste Rodin outside of Paris and the Soumaya Museum in Mexico City.

The special exhibit showing at the Cantor at the time of the conference is "Second Nature: Photography in the Age of the Anthropocene," which explores the complexities of this proposed new age: vanishing ice, rising waters, and increasing resource extraction, as well as the deeply rooted and painful legacies of colonialism, forced climate migration, and socioenvironmental trauma.

HOOVER TOWER AND EXHIBITION

COST: \$8 for access to observation deck

Visitors can view portions of the collection in the ground floor exhibition galleries and see the historic Belgian carillon on the 14th floor observation deck, which also offers panoramic views of the surrounding area.

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
